


Groups that provide motorized public lands trail support

Our stewardship is demonstrated by our "on-the-ground" work of clearing and maintaining trails on public lands. We have worked with and continue to work with other motorized groups, as well as non-motorized groups - i.e. dirtbikes, horses, hikers, and mountain bikers - so that we can all share and enjoy public lands.</p> <p>The BRR also aids in several volunteer projects for the US Forest Service, Idaho Department of Lands, Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation and other agencies. Currently, the BRR is working with both the US Forest Service and the Idaho Department of Lands to obtain grants to conduct feasibility studies to implement motorized trails in Idaho. The BRR has also joined with other organizations such as the Blue-Ribbon Coalition, Southern Idaho Desert Racing Organization (SIDRA), Stay on Trails, Treasure Valley Trail Machine Association (TVMTA) and others to preserve our right to ride dirtbikes on public land.</p> <p>Members clear over 100 miles of single-track dirtbike and multi-use trail each year.</p> |
